

ESTIMATING HIDDEN INFESTATIONS IN RICE BY MEASURING CARBON DIOXIDE LEVELS

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
INTRODUCTION



Infestations by *Sitophilus* species cause significant losses in the rice value chain. Most of the life cycle of these insects occurs inside the grains, making infected grains indistinguishable by the naked eye [1]. The amount of CO_2 in rice storage is correlated to infestation, due to the insects' respiration rate [2]. Therefore, it is possible to estimate hidden infestations in rice by measuring CO_2 levels. This method can be effective in detecting hidden infestations and preventing waste [3].

CO₂ levels gradually increase throughout the *Sitophilus* life cycle and start to decrease at the adult stage. Modern sensors can accurately predict and detect incipient or ongoing hidden infestations.
